Broadcasting in a Virtual World By Jesse Lerman, President and CEO, TelVue Corporation

Between advancements in technology and the pandemic, the progression to an increasingly virtual world is accelerating. Almost everything is veering virtual - work, school, meetings, events, conferences, major motion picture releases, doctor's appointments, grocery shopping, you name it. While vaccines will hopefully reopen the world soon this year, there is little doubt that virtual is here to stay, including throughout the broadcast industry.

From traditional broadcast to OTT, Social Media to phones and apps, your channels and content need to be everywhere.

- Concerts, single or multi-camera: coverage of community concerts.

A Quick Light Plot for Your Virtual Meetings By Paul Distefano, Northeast Regional Sales Manager, DeSisti

If the pandemic has taught us anything, it is that many of us can continue to meet with our customers and colleagues "virtually" to conduct business. In the virtual world of Zoom, Teams, Skype and other internet meeting platforms, we sometimes do not look our Sunday best! However, with just a few inexpensive lights, strategically placed, you can greatly improve the quality of your virtually transmitted image. Since we cannot dress to impress and meet with each other in person very easily anymore, let's see how we can make our avatars do it for us!



The first thing to consider is where you place your camera. If you are using a laptop camera, you have the luxury of finding the best place in your home to shoot. Consider things like windows. Natural sunlight can be a great key light. It can also serve as a great back light, too. Just make sure that you then have sufficient artificial light out in front of you to balance it out. If you can, avoid or do what you can to control natural light coming in from the sides. It is just much easier to take advantage of natural light from either the front or back. In my home office, I have such a challenge. Over the past few years, I have converted all the lighting in my condo to dimmable LED bulbs with color temps between 5000°-6000° K. So, I can use any fixture I have on camera. Because all my lighting is cool, windows and sunlight are not an issue. It is very important that you try your best NOT to mix color temps. It will make things easier on your web cam.

My home office desk is located against a wall facing directly west. I have a 2-bay window right in front of me so, as I sit at my desk, I can look directly outside over my condo complex's courtyard. To my right is my computer hutch. My laptop & web cam are located on the right side of the hutch. As I face the camera, the windows are at about 135° to my left. Remember I said my windows face west..... well, this means the sun is blaring through all afternoon. But I have found a way to do battle with the sun with just a few inexpensive lights that can be picked up at Home Depot for less than \$42.00. With some adjustments, I have found these do a pretty good job both during the day, as well as at night. BTW, all images below are screen grabs from Zoom and are unedited.



My "key" light is an 8" USB rechargeable task light which I have mounted over my laptop monitor. It is very cool, about 6000° K, and the CRI is relatively low, at 73. This is actually comparable to some of the first generation of LED lighting fixtures for use in TV and film. I know that I personally sold them to many broadcasters back in the day, so I figure if it was good enough for broadcast a few years ago, it should work for webcams today! I have found them to be perfectly acceptable, considering that the vast majority of the people I have had online meetings with have no lighting at all! It is secured to the underside of my hutch cabinet with Velcro.



I use two 4" versions of the same light as my left and right "fills". These have powerful magnets on them, so I just super-glued some steel washers to my hutch and stick them on when I participate in meetings. I first started with two of the 8"



lights, stood up vertically left and right of the monitor. This worked well, but I wanted the lights to be more eye level, so I came up with this solution. All three have three settings so I can dim them as needed based on the amount of ambient light coming in.







Another thing to consider is your background. If it is not sufficiently lit, you may have too much contrast, and appear to "bloom" in front of a dark background. Luckily, I have accumulated a few lights over the years, so I have a typical 1x1 panel light that I put on a stand to just light the wall behind me. I set this to 5600° K and heavily

diffuse it. Depending on the time of day, I can dim this light as low as 15-20%. Again, this is just to balance out your front lighting to control the level of contrast in the frame. You can use any directional light to do this. Just make sure it is outside the field of view of your web cam. In the evenings, I also use my desk lamp to light up the white blinds on my windows, again, to balance foreground and background light levels as much as possible. This is particularly useful at night, where even at the lowest setting, my front lighting is too hot. Lighting these white blinds will allow your camera's iris to close a bit so your front lighting will not be so harsh.



A simple combination, such as this, will work well. Nobody expects you to look like the broadcast networks. During this past year, while reporting from home, many local newscasters had even less sophisticated setups than this. But if you really want to separate yourself from the crowd, then separate yourself from your background with a backlight. If you have the time, and a small spot like a Fresnel, and a stand, this will make a huge difference. Position it outside the frame, spot it to focus, then flood it out and dim it to an appropriate level and, if possible, diffuse it as well. This will be about 20-30% of the light




level on your face. You don't need a meter. You can do this by eye. Remember, earlier, I said that you could use natural light as a backlight? If this is the case, then use your Fresnel as your key and any two lights you have as left and right fills. Just keep them outside the frame!

While none of this is critical, and nobody expects you to have access to TV lighting and grip gear at home, try to experiment. Don't be afraid to use reflective surfaces, like a foam board, to bounce light. If you have more than one

monitor, pull up a blank Word document. You would be surprised how much light it can throw! If you spend a little time, use what you have at your disposal creatively, and bring a few of the techniques you use in your studios at home, your virtual self will look great on the other side of your meetings.

Oh, and by the way, wear a neutral color shirt...... more of that contrast thing I keep speaking of! And, for God's sake...... watch your headroom! Before the apocalypse, we were judged on our appearance.... Our clothes...... Our shoes. Now, it is all about the headroom. Now that you know how to light yourself, even my fellow camera-unfriendly colleagues can look better, technically. But now the yardstick is headroom! Trust me, nobody wants to talk to Kilroy and look at your ceiling. Oh, and by the way, if you got that reference, you are at least a Boomer..... or older. If not, Google it, youngster!

new shows are posted. We need to get 100 subscribers to get our own JAG YouTube URL.






Social Media Stats Based on Last 30 Days


100 SUBSCRIBERS NEEDED

Asbury Park TV (APTV) Takes on the Coronavirus By Ed Salvas, Secretary, Asbury Park Cable TV Advisory Committee

January 2020 marked the beginning of the eighth year on the air for the Asbury Park Cable TV station, better known around the shore community as APTV. But 2020 would soon become a year of challenges for the station, and for viewers of its programs on Cablevision/Optimum and Verizon FiOS.



Staffed by volunteers and part time technicians and advised by a committee of nine members, the city recognized there was a need for APTV to have a full time Station Manager and begin an expansion to include a second channel and upgrade of its equipment. Station Manager Nate McCallister was scheduled to start on Monday, March 16.

That was the day City Hall was closed because of the rapidly spreading Covid 19 Pandemic and everyone was working from home. With Nate's background in commercial TV, he was able to keep the station on the air and provide information and entertainment to a community that was stuck at home.

During the Pandemic we curated dozens of PSAs on Covid 19 from the CDC, state and county. These ranged from preventing infections through mask-wearing, hand washing, and social distancing, detecting infections in yourself and others, caring for infections, contact tracing and minimizing stress. Because schools were closed and classes were held remotely, we had discussions on talking with children about a Pandemic and returning to school and returning to work. We also utilized the station to share free Covid 19 testing dates and locations and now information about getting the vaccine.

Asbury Park Mayor John Moor appeared on APTV to help communicate the new rules in place as the summer season approached with limited dining and the city's popular nightclubs, including the Stone Pony, Paramount Theater and Convention Hall, closed and daily beach badge sales limited. Government continued to function with the City Council, and the various Boards and Commissions taking to ZOOM for meetings, hosted by APTV.

At the same time, APTV began laying the groundwork for "APTV-2." McCallister said APTV plans to use the second TV channel as an information hub for all city residents, employees and business owners and tourists. Using digital signage hardware and software from our longtime partner TelVue, APTV will have up to the minute weather event and safety information available via cable TV, the website, www.AsburyParkTV.com, and the Roku/Apple apps. Rollout is expected in the Spring 2021. APTV serves the city of Asbury Park on Optimum channels 77 and 116 and Verizon FiOS channels 28 and 30.

The new channel is not the only new development at APTV. Changes are also planned in other areas where the technology that was available in 2013 has been replaced by newer technology for the 21st century. APTV last year purchased a Sling Studio for use in multi-camera situations. The Sling Studio was first used to live stream the Asbury Park High School Graduation, which took place in the summer because of Covid 19 restrictions. The outdoor ceremony has been viewed more than 500 times. The station also added a new SONY Camcorder, a SONY 4k, model PXW-Z150. Other improvements are being considered for the Council Chambers. Originally, there was just one camera mounted on a tripod that was replaced by two PTZ cameras from GRAMCO which also updated the audio system in the room.

Hopefully, the Council and the public will be able to return to City Hall when the world returns to "normal."
